History of the Waukesha County Operating While Intoxicated Treatment Court

The Waukesha County Operating While Intoxicated (OWI) Treatment Court (OTC) is the first alcohol treatment court in Wisconsin. The program is based on a drug court model, which has 10 key components that WCS integrates and follows. The drug court model has been around since 1989 when the first drug court was established in Miami-Dade County, Florida. As of 2020, there were more than 3,800 active drug courts in the United States.

There are 74 active drug courts in Wisconsin and the Waukesha program is the first to focus solely on alcohol as the drug of choice. The WCS Waukesha County OWI Treatment Court staff consists of two full-time employees; one supervisor and one manager. Staff are members of the NADCP (National Association of Drug Court Professionals) and attend trainings on an annual basis. Planning for this program began in 2004, participants started enrolling in May 2006, and WCS began providing the service in December 2006. The program held its first graduation ceremony in June 2007, with nine graduates. Since inception, there have been 514 graduates through December 2021. There were 24 graduations in 2021.

The mission of Waukesha County OWI Treatment Court is to protect the public by reducing recidivism among OWI offenders through intensive court supervision and treatment.

What is the Waukesha County OWI Treatment Court?

The Waukesha County OWI Treatment Court offers the repeat drunk driver the opportunity to break the cycle of drunk driving, improve the chances of a sober and healthy life, and contribute to a safe community.

How Do I Qualify to Participate?

- 18 years of age or older
- Plead guilty to 3rd or 4th OWI offense
- Waukesha County resident (at time of application and for duration of program)
- No prior violent felony convictions
- Voluntary participation
- Meet criteria of an objective risk tool
- Must be approved by the OWI team prior to sentencing

What does the Path to Success Look Like?

You have the opportunity to:

- Increase your chances of living a healthy and sober life
- Heal relationships with family and friends
- Spend less time in jail
- Receive ongoing, individual support
- Experience freedom from alcohol dependence
- Enjoy better health

How Long Does it Take?

The length of the program is determined by each participant's progress through the five phases. Graduation may occur within one year, but it is likely to take additional time beyond that depending on the participant's treatment needs.

How Does the Program Work?

- Admission: Takes place at sentencing and is dependent on available openings in the program.
- Court Appearances: The Judge will actively monitor your case through regular court appearances.
- Assessment: The Addiction Resource Council conducts a Driver Safety Plan Assessment which determines your level of treatment. A list of approved treatment providers will be provided.
- Treatment and Support: Ongoing, individualized treatment is required in addition to self-help group attendance.
- Incentives & Sanctions:
 Rewards are given for positive behavior and sanctions are imposed for inappropriate behavior.
- Case Management: Your Case Manager will provide support and monitoring to assist you in reaching your goals. Electronic monitoring, random urinalysis, and home visits are used.
